


OVERVIEW OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF THE DISTRICT OF

# CLARE

Welcome to the Municipality of the District of Clare, also commonly referred to as Saint Marys Bay. This municipality is located within the County of Digby in southwestern Nova Scotia. The Clare region extends along Saint Marys Bay, opening on the Gulf of Maine. It is situated between the ports of Yarmouth and Digby, each of which has a major ferry service with one running to the United States (to and from Yarmouth) and the other to and from St. John, New Brunswick (operating out of Digby). Regional airports offer commercial and private options for air travel. Highway 101 passes directly through the region, with Highway 1 being the more scenic provincial tourist route affectionately named the Evangeline Trail.

Clare is home to over 8,000 residents, with more than 60% who communicate in French. The region is mainly comprised of Acadians who demonstrate a strong sense of pride in their language, culture, and heritage. 71% of Clare's population self-identifies as being able to communicate in both of Canada's official languages.

### FRANCOPHONE UNIVERSITY/COLLEGE CAMPUS

The Municipality of the District of Clare is home to the main campus of Université Sainte-Anne, the only francophone post-secondary institution in Nova Scotia. The Church Point campus houses the administrative offices, in addition to offering university and college programs and courses in the Clare region, as well as province-wide at its four satellite campuses through videoconferencing.

Université Sainte-Anne's Church Point campus plays a pivotal role in Acadian and francophone development in the Clare region, offering not only learning opportunities, but also significant infrastructure such as a library, a research center, an entrepreneurship center, a sports complex, a theater, an art gallery, an artist's workshop, a tourist Information center, a cultural interpretative center, and a café.

### MOST PREVALENT OCCUPATIONS AND TRADES IN CLARE REGION

The economy of the Municipality of the District of Clare relies heavily upon the service industry (tertiary), most notably occupations and trades related to non-commercial activity and the knowledge-based economy. This sector represents more than 58% of workers, while the secondary industry (manufacturing and production) represents approximately 25% of the workforce. Only 17% of the local workforce is employed in the primary industry, that of natural resources.

The highest employment rates are in occupations related to trades, transportation, machinery and related occupations, sales and services and occupations specific to the primary sector. Given its coastal location, it is natural that the economy is heavily influenced by the sea. In fact, there are several port facilities and traditional trades still being practiced, all relating to the fisheries. The economy depends significantly upon the processing of various species of seafood, as well as ship repairs and construction.

Clare's economy is diversified and offers professional opportunities in health care and social services, education, wholesale and retail trade, as well as other professional and commercial services. The economy of the municipality also relies upon workers in the tourism industry, entrepreneurship and self-employment initiatives.
